

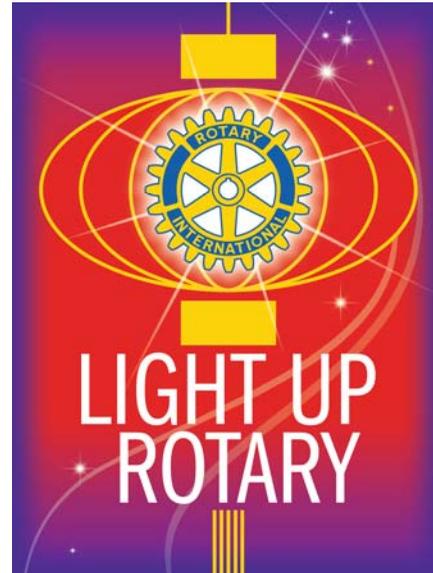

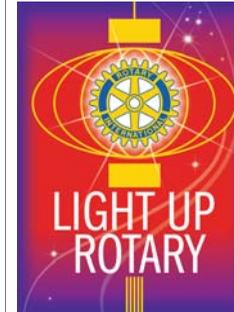

As Jonathan's tenure as president of the KY-COM Rotaract club comes to a close, he comes

today to talk about the highlights of the past year and what he feels has been the club's lasting accomplishments. The Rotaract club is the second largest club at UPIKE with 140 members and probably the most active, accumulating over 3000 hours of community service. He thanked the Rotary Club for support and the joint projects with which the club participated, such as "Coats for Kids", Habitat for Humanity and many others.

Jonathan said that the greatest accomplishment was the medical mission trip to the Dominican Republic. For eight days in July, 56 people, including 37 medical students, partnered with medical professionals and local leaders to provide clinical treatment and distribution of over \$200,000.00 worth of vitamins, antibiotics and other medications which are donated by local hospitals, corporations, pharmacies and individuals who give personal donations of money to purchase these supplies. The trip also provides an opportunity for the students to practice their skills under the supervision of the doctors that go along with them. Some worked in construction projects, some taught the people to brush their teeth and practice personal hy-

giene while others provided educational activities with an emphasis on disease prevention and cultural exchange.

Most of the natives they treat are in the lowest rung of poverty as they eke out a living working in the cane fields for just over a dollar a day. It is brutally hard and dangerous work, 7 days a week, all year around and is often the source of many lacerations, untreated wounds that get infected as well as serious parasitic infestations, which should get professional medical intervention, but it is not universally available or affordable.

As incredible as it may seem, there is an additional benefit for both the students and others who travel with them on the trip. Jonathan says it was amazing to him to see these people smile with joy to know that there are people in the world who care enough just to come there to help them. They experienced a once-in-a-lifetime picture of life in a culture so far removed from anything they have ever known and from which they had been isolated. That in itself has created a zeal to help that will remain with them for the rest of their lives. Isn't that what Rotary is all about?
