Speaker: Dr. David Barnett, Dean of the Patton College of Education—UPIKE



Dr. Barnett earned a B.S. in education and his M.A. in Instructional Supervision from Morehead State University and his Doctorate of Education from the University of Kentucky. After 23 years' service in the P-12 sector as a teacher, Instructional Supervisor and Superintendent of Schools in Bracken and Fleming Counties, he served 13 years in Post-Secondary education.



Dean Barnett said that the rural-ity of this area was also an asset and commended those who study and train here to return to their communities to teach others to succeed.

He was given the Distinguished Service Award by the KY Association of School Administrators and the NAACP Educator of the Year Award in 2001. He was also named the Statewide Administrator of the Year and the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America Award in 1994.

As Dean of the Patton School of Education at UPike, he shared the goal of being one of the top colleges of education in five years. In order to reach this, he says, they have adopted the "Hedgehog Philosophy", which states:

- (1) What do you do better than anyone else,
- (2) What are you most passionate about, and
- (3) What is the economic engine that drives you?

At UPike, he believes that course requirements should emphasize human growth and development, more clinical student teaching experience in the early years of the student's work, case studies of successful curriculum practices, using seasoned teachers who model good teaching and empowering them to make decisions and learn from them.

He also stated that he began to examine the assets that UPIke possessed that would help them be assured of reaching their 5 – year goal.

Among these are exceptionally talented students, nationally recognized departments such as the College of Osteopathic Medicine, the faith-based organizations behind the university, great leadership and the scenic beauty of this rural community.

Dean Barnett said that the rurality of this area was also an asset and commended those who study and train here to return to their communities to teach others to succeed. He says he tells his students to celebrate “place” (their culture and traditions) and to learn that rurality does not mean poverty. He avowed that rurality does not mean less rigor and expectations must be kept high. He stressed to students that rural teachers need to understand that they will often wear many hats, face challenges of transporting children great distances and the need to master future technologies in order to compete with the rest of the world. He says these assets give great confidence that UPIke will reach the aforementioned goal and our students will have the best trained teachers possible.

There are two ways to receive matching points:

The 1 for 1 Match

If you want to immediately become a Paul Harris Fellow or a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, now is the time. Starting on November 1, 2015, contributions greater than or equal to \$100.00 to the [Annual Fund](#), [PolioPlus](#) or an approved Global Grant of The Rotary Foundation that will take you to the Paul Harris Fellow level or Paul Harris Fellow multiple level if matched 1:1 with a transfer of Foundation Recognition Points (FRP’s) will be matched.

Example 1a: If your current Recognition Amount is at 400 and you make a contribution of \$300.00 to the [Annual Fund](#), [PolioPlus](#) or an approved Global Grant of The Rotary Foundation, it will be matched with 300 non-transferable FRP’s bringing you to the 1,000 Recognition Amount and you become a Paul Harris Fellow. (400 existing Recognition Amount + 300 recognition from your contribution + 300 non-transferrable FRP’s from the match = 1,000 Recognition Amount)

Example 1b: If your current Recognition Amount is at 1,400, 2,400, etc., the donations and non-

transferrable FRP’s of Example 1a will move you to Paul Harris Fellow +1, +2, etc.

Example 2: You make a contribution of \$500.00 to the [Annual Fund](#), [PolioPlus](#) or an approved Global Grant of The Rotary Foundation, it will be matched with 500 non-transferrable FRP’s and you are a Paul Harris Fellow. (500 recognition from your contribution + 500 non-transferrable FRP’s from the match = 1000 Recognition Amount)

The 1 for 2 Match

This match has the added benefit of reduced administrative costs at TRF, and therefore is being offered as a 1 for 2 match.

Starting on November 1, 2015, if you make a contribution equal to or greater than \$100.00 to the [Annual Fund](#) or [PolioPlus](#) through [Rotary Direct](#) (Rotary’s re-occurring giving program) to immediately become a Paul Harris Fellow or a multiple Paul Harris Fellow, your gift will be matched 1:2 with FRP’s.

Example 3a: : If your current Recognition Amount is at 100 and you sign to make an annual contribution of \$300.00 through [Rotary Direct](#) to the [Annual Fund](#), or [PolioPlus](#) , it will be matched with 600 non-transferable FRP’s. (100 Recognition Amount + 300 recognition from your contribution + 600 non-transferrable FRP’s from the match = 1,000 Recognition Amount)

Example 3b: : If your current Recognition Amount is at 1,100, 2,100, etc., the donations and non-transferrable FRP’s of Example 3a will move you to Paul Harris Fellow +1, +2, etc.

Example 4: You sign up to become a **NEW** annual [Paul Harris Society](#) contributor of \$1,000.00 through [Rotary Direct](#) with a gift to the [Annual Fund](#), or [PolioPlus](#) , it will be matched with 2,000 non-transferrable FRP’s and you are a Paul Harris Fellow+2. (1,000 recognition from your contribution + 2,000 non-transferrable FRP’s from the match = 3,000 Recognition Amount)
